The Global Internet Report 2017 identifies the factors that will impact the future of the Internet in the coming years. The report takes into account the numerous forces shaping the Internet, from artificial intelligence (AI) and cyber threats to Internet economy and increasing government involvement. It explores how these forces will impact in key areas such as digital divides, freedoms and personal rights and media and society.

One of the main findings of this report is that there is still optimism: younger users and those in developing countries are especially optimistic about the future of the Internet and the possibility of using technology to improve their lives and create their future.
