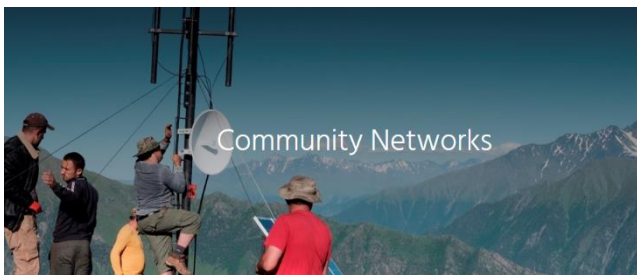

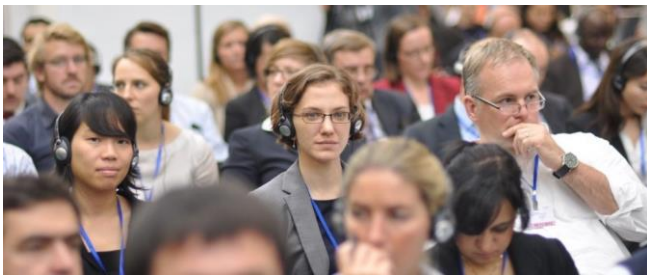
### What is the cost of cybercrime?

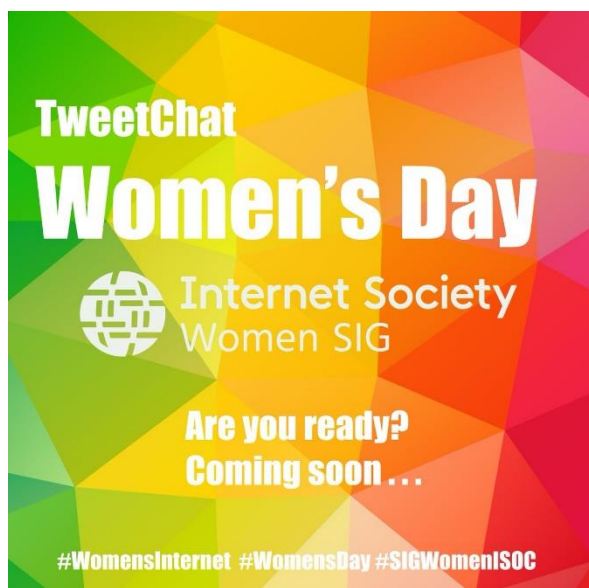
